Ex-police chief likens riots to terrorism

Former Counter-terrorism Head Neil Basu has stated that recent violence during the riots has 'crossed the line into terrorism.' Basu, who served as the UK's top counter-terrorism officer from 2018 to 2021, expressed hope that his successors were closely monitoring the situation.

Speaking to the BBC, Basu said, 'We have witnessed serious acts of violence intended to incite terror within parts of our community.' He also emphasised the need to carefully assess the legal definition of terrorism in relation to the recent events.

Basu attributed the surge in violence to misinformation spread on social media, warning, 'We need to take action on this.' The attacks on hotels housing migrants follow years of far-right demonisation, with locations shared online, making future targets unpredictable.

TV show winner delivers football kits to children

A BBC Race Across the World winner has travelled to Malaysia as part of his initiative to make football more accessible in underprivileged parts of the world.

Alfie Watts, from St Albans, Hertfordshire, travelled to Kuala Lumpur to deliver 250kg (39st 5lb) of football kits and boots directly to children who need them most. The 21-year-old worked alongside UK charities, Kit Aid and Charity Boots, and Malaysia-based charity The Lost Food Project to begin Football Starts With Hope.

Watts, who works as a referee, also intends to begin football coaching workshops as part of a larger plan to 'give access to football to as many people as possible. He was quoted: 'I'd hate to not utilise my platform, and granted it's not a huge platform, to push something positive.'

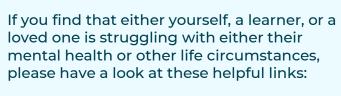

The cost of living has affected many people, but there is support available, especially for apprentices. You may be able to receive help with essential expenses from your local council through programs such as the 'Household Support Fund'. This assistance can help cover costs like:

- energy and water bills.
- food.
- essential household items.

Additionally, your council may provide food vouchers for families during school holidays. Check for any benefits and financial support you may be entitled to here.

Other discounts include:

County Lines

'County Lines' refers to the transportation of illegal drugs from one area to another, often crossing police and local authority boundaries. This activity frequently involves children or vulnerable individuals who are coerced by gangs into drug trafficking. The term 'County Line' also describes the mobile phone line used for taking drug orders. Areas receiving the drugs, known as importing areas, are experiencing a rise in violence and weapons-related crimes as a consequence of this practice. County Lines - National Crime Agency

Drug production booming in UK's empty high streets

Chief Constable Richard Lewis, the National Police Chiefs' Council lead on drugs, stated that the decline of many high streets in recent years has created opportunities for criminals. 'Commercial properties are attractive to organised crime groups for many reasons,' he explained.

With large-scale shops closing, more space becomes available for cannabis production on a bigger scale. Mr. Lewis noted that reduced foot traffic during the evenings allows these cannabis farms to operate undetected.

Last year, police intensified their efforts against cannabis farms, issuing 1,000 warrants and making nearly 1,000 arrests. Gwent Police successfully raided several cannabis farms in Newport city centre, including one at the former Wildings department store, which closed in 2019.

<u>Level 4 Associate Project Manager Apprentice: Angela Rawson</u>

'In August 2020, my life changed forever. On Sunday, 2nd August, my husband took his own life in my horse's stable, leaving me to find him. We were in Covid lockdown, so support was limited, and I lived 200 miles away from my family in the Cotswolds. I made the decision not to tell my family, except for my brother, who was sworn to secrecy to spare my elderly parents from distress. That August, I had to organise my husband's funeral, pack up our house, and arrange transportation for my two horses, all while continuing my day job as a bid manager working from home. By the end of August, I had returned to North Wales, to a house I owned, with all my belongings, two horses, four dogs, and two cats. I finally told my parents what had happened, omitting the more gruesome details.

Understandably, they were devastated that their daughter had faced such a traumatic event. It took the first year just to come to terms with what had happened and to remain in my job. Fortunately, my company was incredibly supportive, and I received much-needed counselling Fast forward to 2023, I lost my dad to cancer in September. I helped my mum with all the necessary arrangements.

I then decided to undertake an apprenticeship with QA, supported by my company. Things started off well, but in February 2024, I faced the prospect of redundancy. This triggered the realisation that I was struggling to manage both the threat of redundancy and the demands of the apprenticeship. I put my studies on hold, and finally, in May 2024, I learned my job was safe. Now, in August, I'm back on my course.

<u>Level 4 Associate Project Manager Apprentice: Angela</u> Rawson

I will never un-see my husband's suicide. It's taken time, counselling, and the support of my family, friends, and company to reach the point where I am today.

I've chosen not to read his suicide note, believing that it won't make my tomorrow any easier. During counselling, I realised that life is for living. I cannot change the past, but I have a long road ahead of me.

Some days are tough – working full-time, keeping an eye on my mum who has Parkinson's, and looking after all the animals. But I've got this. No matter how messy they are or how much they cost, they make me laugh, and I love them to bits. They're with me on this journey.

I've also taken up gardening, which has been a tremendous help for my mental and physical wellbeing. Growing plants from seed, nurturing them into flowers, and producing food to eat and share has been an amazing experience. Now is my time to complete what I started with my apprenticeship, to demonstrate my learning in the workplace, and to be rewarded for it in the year ahead.

I am stronger now, more determined to live life in full colour, filled with fun and laughter alongside family and friends.'
